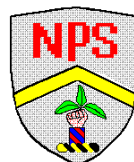

Some children remain static in strands of either Reading, Writing or Maths. This forms the focus of next terms work with these individuals.</p> <p><b>Review July 2014</b> Whole school data analysis of Performance of PP children relative to other pupil groups points to no significant gaps in attainment</p> <p><b>Review Oct 2014</b> Initial data analysis points to a closing of the gaps at L2b+, L4b+ and in some subjects L5 between PP children and other pupil groups</p> <p><b>Review April 2015</b> Published RoL data indicates a closing of the gaps between PP children and other pupil groups. School based data also supports this. In school monitoring of attainment to continue on a termly basis at a whole school level.</p>
